
Term 2 Ends

Kieran Aland, Queensland Museum

Reptiles and their important place in our Eco System, Friday 11th July 9:00am to 10:30am 97 Creek St



The Queensland Museum is a wonderful institution, constantly changing and doing excellent work both in-house and out in the field. We are fortunate to have Zoologist

Kieran Aland from the Museum to give us an insight into the fascinating world of reptiles and the great work that is being done in our Museum. Kieran can either be found in the Discovery Centre at the Queensland Museum or in the field. He consults privately as a field biologist and ecologist and this role regularly takes him into the bush. Working with fauna on an intimate basis provides for some interesting perspectives on the other creatures with which we share our landscape. Kieran's spare time is devoted to his daughter and a private Botanical Engineering project on the Darling Downs.

Dr Leon Hugo QIMR

Biting Back—Dengue in the Tropics, Wednesday 9th July 11:00am to 12:30am 97 Creek St



The most dangerous creature on the planet is the mosquito and the war against mosquito-borne viruses is a fascinating scientific story of invasive blood-suckers, biological warfare, quad bikes, helicopters and pot plants in your backyard. Dr Hugo is a

Research Officer with the QIMR Berghofer Medical Research Institute where he researches the transmission of mosquito-borne viruses and malaria parasites by mosquitoes. He will discuss current approaches in the fight against dengue, including biological control using natural bacterial infections of insects that block the subsequent infection of mosquitoes by the dengue virus. Dr Hugo will put these dangerous little insects under the microscope and take you on a journey of discovery into the war being waged in Queensland and all over the world.

<u>Dr Ian Muirhead</u> PLANTS – BUGS – BIOLOGY – BORDERS Wednesday 9th July 11:00am to 12:30pm



Dr Ian Muirhead, Retired Director of Plant Pathology at the Department of Primary Industries, has prepared an interesting presentation on a range of Australian plants and the dangers they face from pathogens – just like us. The story of how these problems are solved unravels like a giant puzzle and our

scientists are pretty good at it. Then there is the continual battle to keep our borders safe from invasive insects and pathogens that can come from overseas. Decades of experience with the scientific aspects of plant disease ensure that Dr Muirhead is well placed to speak on this subject and you will find his talk as entertaining as it is informative.
