# Sudden passing of Pam Mathers and Judy Walker

Wednesday History group

**Judy Walker** was born in 1935 in Brisbane. She went to Brisbane Girls Grammar and was dux of her graduating year. She then went to the University of Queensland to study dietetics and soon after graduating got a job in Fiji as a dietician. Here she met my father, Eric, who was working as a surveyor. My sister Sue and I were born in Fiji but the family moved back to Brisbane in the early seventies. Judy continued working in dietetics and received an Order of Australia Medal for services to nutrition following her retirement. Just this year a lecture was given in her honour at the Dietetics Association of Australia conference. Judy was a keen traveller and loved to learn new things. In recent years she had travelled to Japan, on the Trans-Siberian railway through Mongolia and Russia and to Turkey. She was a feisty and independent woman who was very much loved by her family.

#### **Pam Mathers**

Pam Mathers, who attended the U3A History group for the past 18 years and was a leader for many of them, died in early August aged 83. She was a primary school teacher during her working career and had also had a love of all things historical. She, along with her late husband, Ken, travelled widely, from adventures through post war Europe in the early '50s in an old Austin Seven and followed on with many overseas trips after their children had left home. China, India, Pakistan and Burma were the regular haunts and always on a shoe string budget, that in turn made great adventures. After Ken died, the adventures started with a shipping theme and trips on large container ships through the Panama to the US, through the Suez Canal to Germany provided a good start to several Trans-Siberian adventures, which included a stay in the famed Ice Hotel and then later trips to the depths of northern mid-Russia via Vladivostok to the permafrost lands. Following these great holidays, she started writing books that placed the reader in the midst of her experiences. These were published by Zeus and are often found on Council Library shelves. She inspired a new generation of travellers, with her family taking on out of the way trips. Always of a generous nature, she loved her Wednesday History group and often told her family about her History 'assignments', along with the many other talks she encouraged others to do as well as the end of term guizzes and prizes. I'm sure she will be much missed by all the wonderful friends she made through U3A.
