A very happy Christmas to you all. Have a safe and happy holiday and we look forward to seeing you all in January 2015.



### Book Review

Thea Biesheuvel has been a U3A Creative Writing Tutor for many years. She is a remarkably talented lady who has published over 20 works in her career and 'Dutch Treat' is her latest.

This delightful little book is a series of short stories built around the lives of Thea's ancestors in the marshy land that became the Holland that we know today.

A family history stretching from 1400AD to the present day would normally be of little interest to anyone other than a family member, but not so here. Thea has melded fact with fiction by clever characterisation of her early ancestors and using the quite detailed resources of family members for the latter more truthful history of her family.

Her research has been thorough, and by telling it in the first person, she has breathed life into these people and at the same time given us snapshots of lives lived long ago; the day to day activities, the bits of tribal and general history, all help to round out the characters and make them believable.

As these new characters introduce themselves there is a feeling of immediacy. It is easy to slip inside their heads and the vivid descriptions and language place the reader in that time and in that place. To achieve this takes experience, imagination and great skill, and Thea has managed to do this quite seamlessly. There is drama, humour and pathos to be found between these pages and the history of how Holland was reclaimed from the sea and the ongoing battle to keep it, adds extra interest.

She writes beautifully. Her words flow and scenes play out like a movie in one's head. It is not a long book, and the stories are self contained, so it is just the thing to keep beside the bed, to be dipped into and out of at will, without any fear of losing the thread.

This is a little gem and it comes highly recommended.
