Special Event: *Ordinary People, Extraordinary Acts* from Marilyn Wagland

Peter Baruch: Ordinary People, Extraordinary Acts. Thursday October 31 at 2.00 pm, Room 16, 232 Adelaide Street.

Peter Baruch is alive today because of the courage of Chiune Sugihara, the Japanese Vice Consul in Lithuania during the Second World War. Peter is a volunteer for the B'nai B'rith initiative **Courage to Care**, which celebrates people who chose to stand up and confront discrimination and injustice — ordinary people who were extraordinary in their bravery and impact. The program focusses on the legacy of some of the heroes of the Holocaust during the rise to power of the Nazi Party in Germany and during WW11. Some of these names may be familiar to you - the Bosnian Moslem Dervis Kurkut, the Englishman Sir Nicolas Winton, the Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg, - but perhaps not Chiune Sugiahara.

Chiune Sugihara, risking his job and the lives of his family, helped some six thousand Jews flee Europe by issuing transit visas to them so that they could travel through Japanese territory. History will come alive as this Holocaust survivor tells us about

the bravery of the people who played a role in their rescue and survival. There will be an opportunity to reflect on what the courage of heroes such as Chiune Sugiahara can teach us today about standing up to discrimination and injustice - not to be bystanders, but to make a difference whenever possible.

I do hope you can come along and hear this remarkable story and experience the Courage to Care Program. **Bookings are essential** and may be made either <u>via the website</u> or by phoning the U3A office 3236 3055.

October meeting: Evolving Technologies.

Evolving Technologies traces four main media technologies: radio, music, films and television from their beginnings in radiograms, gramophones, movie theatres and black and white TV to today's streaming technologies. A timeline of each is presented, along with a glimpse of today's streaming incarnation (Netflix, Spotify, Freeview) accessible at home via a website, computer, or on-the-go via a smart phone app.



A fifth evolution is the way computer interaction has evolved from punched cards to voice assistants. The latter area is explored in depth, with many examples of the way we seniors can compensate for failing eyesight, memory or shaky hands through the use of assistants like Siri, Google Assistant and Bixby. Not only are these assistants a boon for older users, but in many ways they are demonstrably faster and arguably more efficient to use.
