Marguerite Marshall: The Climate Change Emergency and Solutions. Thursday November 21, 2.00 – 3.30 pm, Adelaide Street

Millions of children and adults in Australia and other countries recently marched demanding emergency action to prevent dangerous Climate Change. Nearly all of the world’s climate scientists say we are in a climate change emergency. Why is this happening? What is dangerous climate change? Can we ensure a safe climate change future? If so - how?

Marguerite Marshall was trained as a presenter on climate change and its solutions by Al Gore (the former US vice president who was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his work on combating climate change). She will address these questions and solutions at a special presentation at U3A Brisbane (232 Adelaide Street) on Thursday, November 21st from 2pm to 3.30pm. One is the **Philosophy** class currently held at Logan, the other two – **Flash Photography Advanced**, and **Arduino Computer Programming** – are completely new. Days and times will not be finalised until we know the level of interest for each of the classes. Re the Arduino class, the preference is that it be held at Wynnum. However, if most potential students are city-based, the class will be held at the U3A computer lab

1. **Philosophy Ancient and Modern**

Discussion of ideas from Ancient Greece to the 21st Century. How philosophy is relevant and ideas through the ages still apply to issues of today.

2. **Flash photography - Advanced.**

This very hands-on class is aimed at people with a camera that can be operated completely manually and has at least a built-in flash. However, having an external flash puts lots more flash power in your hands and opens up many more creative uses of off-camera flash photography. The first few lessons will cover the basics of how our grandfathers used their cameras and flash guns, no built-in light meters then! We will take perfect photos in bright sunlight, deep shadows and in dim light with our flash, all without an exposure meter or histogram in sight. Then we'll move on to using fill flash to lighten shadows, soft light to soften features and hard light to highlight features. In the final lesson when we all understand what we are doing, we'll examine the secrets of successful flash photography.

3. **Arduino computer programming.**

The Arduino is a small but very capable micro controller that can be used to sense and control many things. It is similar to, but much less sophisticated than the Raspberry-pi miniature PC, and is even smaller.

Lesson 1 will show how to turn a light on and off, but the homework will be for you to plan a system that will control a water fountain with four jets which can be made to squirt high and low. Easy when you know how! We will use an eBay [learning kit \(costs \\$35\)](#), which contains about 30 things, more than enough to keep us going for 10 weeks. You will need your own Laptop to program the Arduino, Windows, Mac or Linux. Alternatively, if we use the U3A Computer Lab, it will cost another \$50 each, but laptops will not be needed.

The tutor for the Flash Photography and Arduino courses is Alan Beswick, a retired scientist with 30 years of programming experience, including using the biggest super computer in Queensland at the time. He is also a wood and metal worker and gadgeteer. His garden sprinkler is powered by a Raspberry Pi (few steps above an Arduino) and it hosts its own web page.
