Congratulations to Sister Anne Hetherington from Gabrielle Power West



Congratulations to Sister Anne Hetherington who was awarded the welldeserved honour of **Order of Australia Medal (OAM)** in the 2022 Australia Day Awards. Sr Anne has had a close involvement with U3A in recent years as a member of the Management Committee and through volunteering to work in the U3A office for one day each week.

Anne is a Sister of Mercy and an educator by profession. She spent many years as a secondary school teacher and 12 years as Principal of All Hallows' School. Following her role of Principal, Anne has held governance and senior management positions within the Congregation of the Sisters of Mercy, including Chair of the Council of Mercy Partners which is responsible for the governance of Mercy Ministries (health – Mater Hospitals; education – All

Hallows School Brisbane, St Patrick's College, Townsville, St Rita's Clayfield, St Ursula's Yeppoon, Mount Alvernia Kedron; and Community Service Activities associated with the Aged Care Ministries). She also served as the Chair of the Mercy Heritage Centre.

Anne has a great love of history and this interest has led to her co-authoring a book on *The Correspondence of Mother Vincent Whitty, 1839 to 1892.* Mother Vincent Whitty was the leader of the first five Sisters of Mercy who arrived in Brisbane in 1861. Anne's love of history, particularly Mercy History, has also been articulated in excellent presentations relating to Mercy History in Brisbane and the historical perspective of the St Stephen's Cathedral precinct in Brisbane.

Anne, you can be very proud of the contributions you have made over your career and in retirement to Education, Mercy Ministries, Church History and to community organizations such as U3A. Thank you, many have benefited from your expertise, commitment to Mercy Education and the future direction of Mercy Ministries, Heritage and community involvement.

Windows 11 Released from Greg Taylor

Windows users should now be aware that Microsoft has released Windows 11. Although it is a free upgrade from Windows 10, unusually there are hardware limitations that mean older PCs (older than about 4-5 years) will not be capable of upgrading. If you look at *Settings > Windows Update* you can expect to see either an invitation to upgrade to Windows 11, <u>or</u> a notification "This PC doesn't currently meet the minimum system requirements to run Windows 11". Microsoft has promised that Windows 10 will continue to be supported with regular updates until at least 2025, so there is no great problem if you have an older PC.

What has changed?

The main noticeable changes are:

- Settings windows have been re-organised in a more logical fashion.

- The live tiles that were introduced in Windows 8 are gone and the Start menu pop-up has been redesigned.

- The task bar icons have been moved to the centre of the screen (but can be relocated to the left if you wish)

There are some improvements under the hood but essentially there is nothing too confronting or unusual about the upgrade. The procedure takes about 1-2 hours with at least one manual re-boot, but is a smooth process.

Do I need to upgrade?

Obviously if you see the warning about minimum requirements you have no choice. But if your PC has the required hardware capabilities the timing is up to you. There is no harm done in sticking with Windows 10 for the time being, although it would be advisable to make the change sometime this year unless you are planning to obtain a new laptop or desktop (which will likely come with Windows 11 pre-installed).

Incidentally the two main hardware features needed in order to upgrade to Windows 11 are Secure Boot (part of UEFI, or BIOS as it was previously known) and TPM (Trusted Platform Module). These are enhanced security features that were introduced by hardware manufacturers about 5 years ago. There is plenty of information on the web about these features for those interested.

Meet the Tutors—Roger and Ann Scott

For the last 3 years, Roger and Ann Scott have been guiding U3A students through the de-colonisation of Africa. Roger spent his early years in Tasmania before going to Oxford in 1962 as Tasmania's Rhodes Scholar. While at Oxford he met his wife Ann and together they went to Uganda where he carried out fieldwork for his thesis on the development of trade unions.

Subsequently Roger's academic appointments took them to Sydney, Belfast, Canberra and finally Brisbane where Roger served as Professor of Public Administration at the University of Queensland for ten years. He returned briefly to the ACT as the inaugural Vice-Chancellor of the University of Canberra and then served as Director-General of Education in the Goss era. He resumed his academic career at QUT in 1995 before "retiring" in 2001 to fill a variety of part-time or honorary positions back at UQ and on advisory panels.

Ann's tertiary study began after their children started school, completing a B.Ed. in Canberra, then teaching at the North Brisbane CAE, culminating in her being awarded a PhD for her study into education policymaking in Queensland. She worked in the Queensland Public Service for many years, received state and national honours awards and has published on Queensland politics and public policy, as well as on British history in retirement.

It was while Roger was attending a post-cardiac gym that he heeded the friendly advice from fellow-

exercisers to enrol at U3A. After a couple of years as a student, he had the thought that he too could be a tutor, drawing on his research experience and early career in African studies. The course could appeal to both those who had spent a comparatively short time there and those who had been born there but, for various reasons, had made the decision to emigrate to Australia. His presentations have been complemented by Ann's post-retirement activity as a biographer and social historian, and lectures were frequently brought to life by her direct family links to some of the key actors.

After three years teaching U3A, Roger and Ann judged they would soon have 'met the market' for African studies and decided to offer a new course. Queensland history seemed an appropriate challenge as it was not offered elsewhere on the U3A calendar. The demographic of those initially enrolling in the course was interesting, with only a handful having grown up and been educated in Queensland where the curriculum focussed on British history rather than local studies. Others have been educated in North America, South Africa, Britain, the West Indies, Malaysia and other states of Australia. Enrolments doubled at the second time of offering this term, now providing more balance between outsiders and those with local roots as well as a deepening interest in Indigenous history.
