Australian Traffic Network reporter, Bradley Hunter, inspired a new Brisbane art competition when ABC Radio Brisbane Mornings host, Rebecca Levingston, initiated The Bradley this year in concert with the Brisbane Portrait Prize.

Brisbane hears Bradley Hunter daily on the airwaves and some of ABC 612 Radio's most creative listeners rose to the challenge to take the city's affection for the traffic reporter to another level. Dozens of portraits of the knockabout Aussie radio personality were submitted as part of The

Bradley, Brisbane's newest portrait competition.

The ABC team was impressed with the calibre of entries. "Discovering the creative, mindful and talented people of our city has been so soothing for me among the challenging news of the world," Rebecca Levingston said.

As usual, U3A students were in the thick of it, and invited Brad to the Creative Portraiture class in the current Jacaranda purple wonderland of New Farm Park. We were really motivated when Brad modelled for the class, and were delighted that Rebecca and her team came to sit and draw alongside us. It was also a first time experience for many of us to be interviewed for the ABC broadcasts. It was a good reminder to take advantage of opportunities that come our way, as we learnt so much from it. We were delighted to share the fun with the ABC team and within our U3A community of practising artists.

While congratulations go to Andrew Weil, the inaugural winner of the competition, the U3A class felt they

won some 'brownie points' with five of U3A's emerging artists selected to participate in the pop up exhibition at the ABC Studio foyer for two weeks from 22 October. These artists were Ann Seery, Carmel McCormack, Anne Visona, Jenny Wilson and Janet Mogridge. We were delighted to hear that Janet Mogridge was one of nine finalists invited to attend an ABC studio gathering at which the announcement of the winner was made.

The spirit of the pop up artistic event provided us with an opportunity to widen our horizons and to be actively engaged in a new challenge.





CoralWatch, a not-for-profit citizen science program at The University of Queensland, will present "Coral Reefs and Climate Change, What Can I do?".

The presentation will include coral biology, the importance of coral reefs, threats to coral reefs and how you can become a citizen scientist collecting valuable data on the reef. Rotating activities at the end will include a sustainability quiz and virtual reef monitoring

Thur 24th November 1:30pm to 2:45pm, 232 Adelaide St. lan Stewart, The Atomic School: How the Universe is Made

#### The Periodic Table

In this workshop you will discover the 92 different kinds of atoms which are the building blocks of the entire world as well as 26 synthetic ones that clever scientists have made in the lab. Each has its own personality, that is, its own unique set of properties. Scientists have sorted all atoms into a list, starting with the lightest, hydrogen, and going to the heaviest, uranium, then arranged them into the Periodic Table which has a special shape that I will explain. I call it the "Alphabet of the Universe" because its 92 atoms make up our entire physical Universe just as the letters of the alphabet make our words, sentences and books.

In later sessions we will use magnet-based models to make molecules containing hydrogen, carbon, oxygen and nitrogen atoms. They include H2O, ammonia, NH3, methane, CH4, carbon dioxide, CO2, amino acids and proteins. They are key to understanding our environment as well as all living things on earth. Some of these are even politically charged, so understanding the science behind them is helpful.
