Learning continues to be the theme in my current travels. This time the learning was about myself as well as the people and places I am visiting, currently on the coast of Western Australia. Having done the obligatory (and beautiful) swim with whale sharks, my travelling companions booked a fishing charter. It made economic sense for all six of us to participate, given the fixed price for the boat rather than per person, but I declared my interest would be in the wildlife, and in eating the catch, rather than in the fishing itself. I was very satisfied with the day – there were so many humpback whales the trick was in avoiding them, rather than spotting them; having never seen a sea snake alive, I saw half a dozen swimming and diving, and one eating a fish; there were turtles everywhere, along with short-tailed shearwaters, dolphins, black manta rays and more. Everyone caught fish, apart from the one poor person who was totally incapacitated by seasickness, and me. Then as we started our hour-long return journey, I spotted a fish jumping nearby. The two young men running the charter were very excited: it was a sailfish and I would be given the honour of trying to catch it. Their enthusiasm was infectious, so I accepted the challenge and eventually brought the fish to the side of the boat. It was difficult but exhilarating, especially discovering the beauty of the animal before we released it. So, I learned I do like just catching fish.

**Wednesday 27 September 11am-12:30pm. QIMR Berghofer Medical Research Institute: *New Better Health Together Program – bringing your perspective to the research we do***



The *Better Health Together* program sees community members and people with lived experience of illness or chronic conditions partner with the QIMR Berghofer Medical Research Institute to influence, shape and co-deliver research projects. Dr Nancy Cloake is the Consumer and Community Involvement Lead at the Institute, and is responsible for coordinating the Consumer and Community Involvement Program called *Better Health Together*. She supports both researchers and members of our community at all stages of the research cycle, ensuring involvement is meaningful for all.

Nancy will explain what consumer and community involvement is (and is not), how the *Better Health Together* program works, and how you can get involved with researchers at QIMR Berghofer. You will also hear a QIMR Berghofer researcher share their experience of having a community member partner with their team. Lastly, have your chance to share your stories with Nancy, when she asks *has anyone here been involved in a research project?*

Nancy trained as a medical researcher with a focus in novel treatments for multiple sclerosis, a devastating autoimmune condition, earning her PhD in 2015. Since leaving the laboratory bench she has held roles in communicating research, inspiring curiosity in science within the community, and attracting support for research innovation. She has a keen interest in discoveries that improve human life and human health, and a passion to ensure this knowledge is built upon and shared so it may help those with the greatest need.

Origami helps assist hand-eye co-ordination, tactile/fine motor skills, space/volume awareness, focus/concentration, mindfulness and works left and right hemispheres of your brain. Contributions from speakers of other languages will be welcomed and will form an important part of the course. Meetings will be in tutorial format: I will teach but discussion will be encouraged, provided it is on topic.

## Meet our Volunteers

### Janet McKeon (Management Committee Member)



*I became a member of U3A at the start of 2022. I had always known about it and, when looking for things to be involved in after retiring, I thought it would be good to check out what was available at U3A. I was attracted by the idea of continuing to learn new things and also meet people I might not meet otherwise.*

*My first course was “Women and the Law”, mainly because it gave me a chance to catch up with the tutor who I knew but had not seen for a long time. Also, it is a topic of interest to me. I have also attended “Dangerous Ideas” which was an opportunity to discuss issues which are relevant to our life and world today. I took the course on the Australian Constitution as I grew up and was educated in the UK and had undertaken limited study in this area. Recently, I have been attending a linguistics course which I hope will provide useful insights for the English conversation classes I conduct.*

*I am a lawyer by background and have worked mostly in community legal centres assisting those who find it difficult to access the law and legal system. I was with the Youth Advocacy Centre as a casework lawyer, community legal education lawyer, policy officer and, for the nine and a half years before retiring, CEO. I also worked for a period as a policy officer in the government in the areas of Fair Trading, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships, and Disability Services.*

*Currently I am seeking to involve myself in things which have purpose through a range of volunteer work, such as Rotary projects and English conversation classes for migrants who are trying to improve their English, particularly migrant mothers with young children, and reception duties at U3A on Mondays when needed.*

*As the CEO of a small not-for-profit organisation with limited resources, I had to problem solve everything from the most minor to the most major. I was responsible for the day to day running and governance of the organisation, including budgets, funding and staffing and had to be flexible when things did not go to plan. I have had to engage and work effectively and productively with a range of people in a variety of situations: vulnerable and disadvantaged clients, staff, funding bodies, government Ministers. I believe these experiences will be useful in supporting U3A. I have been on a number of Management Committees over the years so hope that I will be of use.*

*As I had hoped, I have met some really interesting people at U3A.*

As the well-known Carnival of Flowers springs into life, Toowoomba is keen to show off its spectacular gardens once again. There will be over 190,000 bulbs and seedlings planted throughout the city's floral displays and parks to ensure the flowers are blooming perfectly for our visit. We will see some of the top displays and competition gardens, along with the magnificent parks as time permits. Fare includes morning tea and lunch at a local club. If you love flowers and plants you will be first in line to book the trip.

## **Bribie Island Day Cruise on *MV Lady Brisbane***

**Date:** Tuesday, 3 October 2023 (depart 9am, return 5pm)

**Cost:** \$80

**Bookings close:** 26 September 2023. Please advise dietary needs.

On board the *MV Lady Brisbane*, retrace the route of the extremely popular Steamship *Koopa*, travelling past Woody Point, Redcliffe, Deception Bay and the majestic Glasshouse Mountains. Sailing through the Pumicestone Passage we may see turtles, dugongs and migratory shorebirds, before arriving at Bongaree Jetty on Bribie Island.

On the island we have two hours to explore or just take a relaxing stroll along the waterfront. The museum (which is free) is 500m from the jetty. If you turn right at the jetty, the Bowls Club, where you could have coffee or a cold drink while watching the locals compete, is only three minutes away. A further three minutes takes you to the Water Tower with supersized artwork chosen by residents and business operators who live and work nearby. The artwork aims to bring awareness of the region's delicate ecosystem and the important of humans living in harmony with nature. Turning right at the jetty, another option could be to take a half hour walk to Red Beach passing by the RSL, where you might like to take a cool drink with you to Buckley's Hole Bird-hide which is halfway, to do some bird watching. But don't forget, if you plan to go to Red Beach it will be another half hour back.

Cost includes morning/afternoon tea, and barbecue lunch on board.

**Past Event: QAGOMA sculpture visit 21 August**

**QPAC Tickets**
